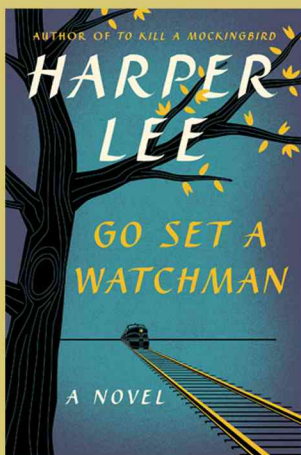

*Directors' Pick*  
**Go Set a Watchman**  
by Harper Lee



An historic literary event: the publication of a newly discovered novel, the earliest known work from Harper Lee, the beloved, bestselling author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning classic, *To Kill a Mockingbird*.

Originally written in the mid-1950s, *Go Set a Watchman* was the novel Harper Lee first submitted to her publishers before *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Assumed to have been lost, the manuscript was discovered in late 2014.

*Go Set a Watchman* features many of the characters from *To Kill a Mockingbird* some twenty years later. Returning home to Maycomb to visit her father, Jean Louise Finch—Scout—struggles with issues both personal and political, involving Atticus, society, and the small Alabama town that shaped her.

Exploring how the characters from *To Kill a Mockingbird* are adjusting to the turbulent events transforming mid-1950s America, *Go Set a Watchman* casts a fascinating new light on Harper Lee's enduring classic. Moving, funny and compelling, it stands as a magnificent novel in its own right.

The term “young adult books” for most people conjures up images of sparkly vampires, an indecisive, love-struck girl, and high school drama. While there are these things in some young adult novels, I think of fast-paced action, witty dialogue, and engrossing, complex characters when I hear the words “young adult books”.

A lot of the books I have been reading and truly enjoying are considered young adult novels. There have even been a few “adult” novels that I have not finished because they didn't capture my imagination like the young adult novels do. A young adult novel that has no vampires or romantic drama is *The Girl Who Was Supposed to Die* by April Henry. It is about a girl who wakes up in a cabin with two men arguing about whether or not to kill her. She has no memory of how she got to the cabin and who she is. *The Giver* series by Lois Lowry is a great young adult series. There are four books in the series: *The Giver*, *Gathering Blue*, *Messenger*, and *Son*. There are many more young adult novels I could name that I think are wonderful.

I have also been reading and enjoying books that are considered children's books. One such book is titled *The Boy on the Porch* by Sharon Creech (This book is in Clyde Public Library's Children's Department). It is about a childless couple that lives on a farm in a small town who wake up one day to find a young boy sleeping on their porch. Where he came from, how he got there, and is someone coming back for him are questions the couple tries to answer while the boy becomes an integral part of their lives. I devoured the book in two days because the characters were charming and complex, their interactions were realistic, and the writing was superb. Another children's book that I read and loved was *No Ordinary Day* by Deborah Ellis. It is about a young girl named Valli who lives in extreme poverty in India, and she finds that she has more in common with the “monsters”, as she calls them, than she thought. Again there are many more children's books that I could name that I think adults would enjoy.

The next time you are looking for a book to read, look in the children's or young adult sections. I think you'll be surprised by the treasures you'll find.
