


#### **Book Babies**



#### Commonwealth by Ann Patchett

#### Hidden Gems: Adult Nonfiction

#### The Power of Positive Thinking by Norman Vincent Peale

A classic program that proves that a change in one's attitude will work a change in one's life. It offers success in all things and a path to overcome all obstacles. No problem is unmanageable, no setback insurmountable. From fear and despair rises the hope of happiness and renewed confidence in life. ... #### Dr. Mütter's Marvels by Cristin O'Keefe Aptowicz

Although he died at just forty-eight, Mütter was an audacious medical innovator who pioneered the use of ether as anesthesia, the sterilization of surgical tools, and a compassion-based vision for helping the severely deformed, which clashed spectacularly with the sentiments of his time. Brilliant, outspoken, and brazenly handsome, Mütter was flamboyant in every aspect of his life. He wore pink silk suits to perform surgery, added an umlaut to his last name just because he could, and amassed an immense collection of medical oddities that would later form the basis of Philadelphia's renowned Mütter Museum. ... this is the never-been-told-before true story of a dramatic turning point in American medicine through the journey and influence of one extraordinary man.

#### The Argument Culture Moving from Debate to Dialogue by Deborah Tannen

The Argument Culture is about a pervasive warlike atmosphere that makes us approach anything we need to accomplish as a fight between two opposing sides. ... Sometimes these approaches work well, but often they create more problems than they solve. Our public encounters have become more and more like having an argument with a spouse: You're not trying to understand what the other person is saying; you're just trying to win the argument.

Tannen explores the roots of the argument culture, the role played by gender, and how other cultures suggest alternative ways to negotiate disagreement and mediate conflicts—and make things better, in public and in private, wherever people are trying to resolve differences and get things done.
