We now have over 60 board/card games that will be available for checkout later this month. On the last Friday, January 29, from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. we will have the first Clyde Library Gaming Group! This month we'll be demonstrating the adult-level strategy game, *Pandemic*.

Board games entertain and bring people together through competitive and cooperative game play. Some of the benefits that you should know about (from www.healthfitnessrevolution.com):

<u>Have fun and feel good:</u> One of the side effects of playing board games is laughing. Laughing has been shown to increase endorphins, those are chemicals that bring up the feeling of happiness. Sharing laughter and fun can promote empathy, compassion, and trust with others.

<u>Family time</u>: Sitting down with family with no interruptions may feel like an impossible thing in your home, as everyone has different schedules which push them in opposite directions. But playing games with your kids, or with your friends, is a perfect way to spend time together and build learning skills at the same time.

Memory formation and cognitive skills: The hippocampus and prefrontal cortex especially benefit from playing board games. These areas of the brain are responsible for complex thought and memory formation. Board games help the brain retain and build cognitive associations well into old age, too.

Speed up your responses: Get yourself a board game like chess, checkers, or Monopoly, and in time you might be better at being able to find those hard-to-find car keys without having to look for them in the entire house.

Reduce stress: You can always benefit from a healthy distraction like playing a board game since it is an excellent way to kick back and relax.

<u>Child development:</u> Board games help children develop logic and reasoning skills, improve critical thinking and boost spatial reasoning. Encouraging children to play different types of board games can also increase verbal and communication skills, while helping develop attention skills and the ability to concentrate and focus for longer periods of time.



Accompanied by various partners and offspring are Harriet, the introspective loner; free-spirited Alice; Fran, the wife of a musician; and Roland, the successful academic, who arrives with his stunning new Argentinian wife. While the adults gossip and argue over whether to spend money on the house in need of repair or to sell up and recoup their losses, the children are left to wander the woods and create mischief in a derelict house they find in the forest. The Sinking of the Titantic, 1912

This is the story of George, who gets to go on the Titanic with his Aunt Daisy and his little sister Phoebe. George is fascinated by the ship. He gets to meet the ship's captain and designer, and even hears a rumor that there's a mummy stowed in the ship's baggage compartment. But when he goes to investigate, he hears a terrible crash...the ship has hit an iceberg?


When I had the idea for the *I Survived* series, I didn't think I would write about the Titanic. There were already so many Titanic books! But my editors all said, "You have to do the Titanic!" And they were right. There is always something new to learn about this fascinating disaster. Award alert! *I Survived the Sinking of the Titanic* is the WINNER of the 2012 Colorado Children's Book Award!

The Bombing of Pearl Harbor, 1941

Pearl Harbor was a surprise bombing attack on American military bases in Hawaii. It was the event that shocked America, and propelled our country into World War II. In my story, Danny Crane is a New York City kid, hanging around gangsters while his mom works 2 jobs to support him. When Danny's best friend Finn is hurt in an accident, Danny's mom decides she has to get Danny away from the danger of New York. They move to Hawaii, and soon find themselves in the midst of the terrifying bombing attack.

Hurricane Katrina, 2005

When I first imagined the I Survived series, I thought I would be writing about events that happened decades in the past. But my editors thought it was important to write about Hurricane Katrina, which was the worst natural disaster in America's history. I took on the challenge, and in the end this is one of my favorite books in the series. The story focuses on Barry Tucker and his family, who live in the New Orlean's Lower Ninth Ward, a neighborhood that had been flooded by a hurricane years before. The family plans to evacuate as Katrina is bearing down on New Orleans. But then Barry's little sister Cleo gets sick, and the family has no choice but to hunker down at home. Barry is swept away by the flood waters, and crosses paths with a killer dog named Cruz. And through it all he learns that he is way braver than he ever imagined.
